Geukens & De Vil invited seven Belgian artists PHILIP AGUIRRE Y OTEGUI, RUBEN BELLINKX,

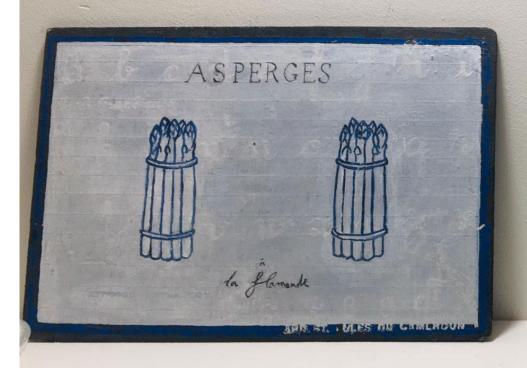

Their artistic response is presented in the exhibition CONFINED CHALLENGE, showing how art remains a necessary tool to reflect upon the world.

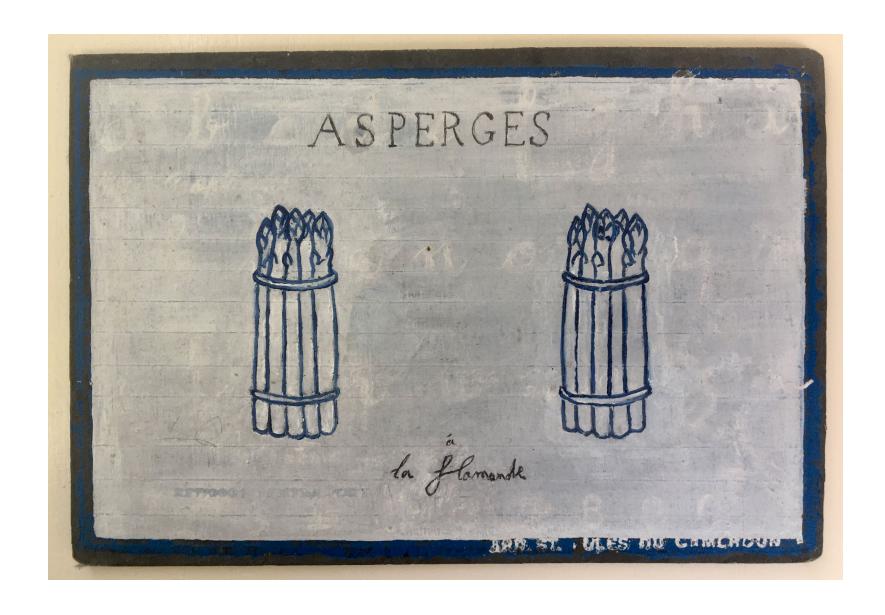
In addition, each artist provided an image of their work placed inside their studio.

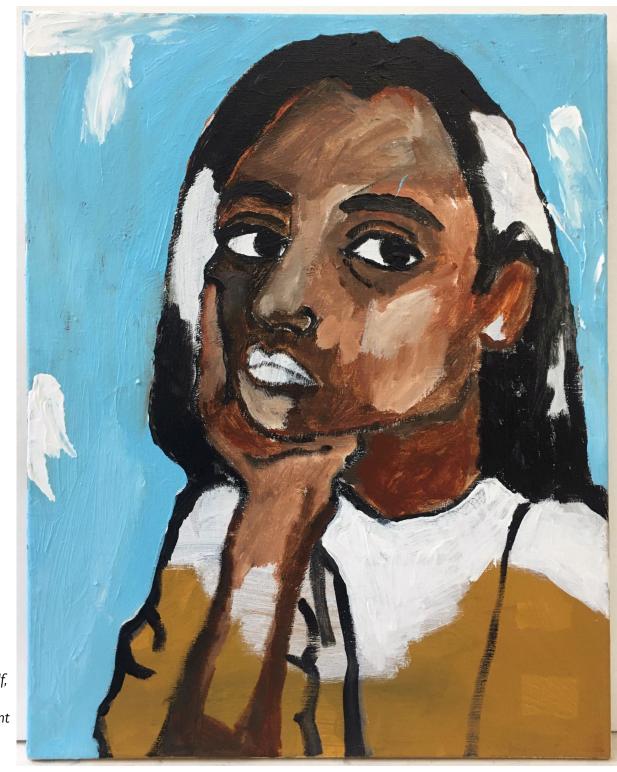




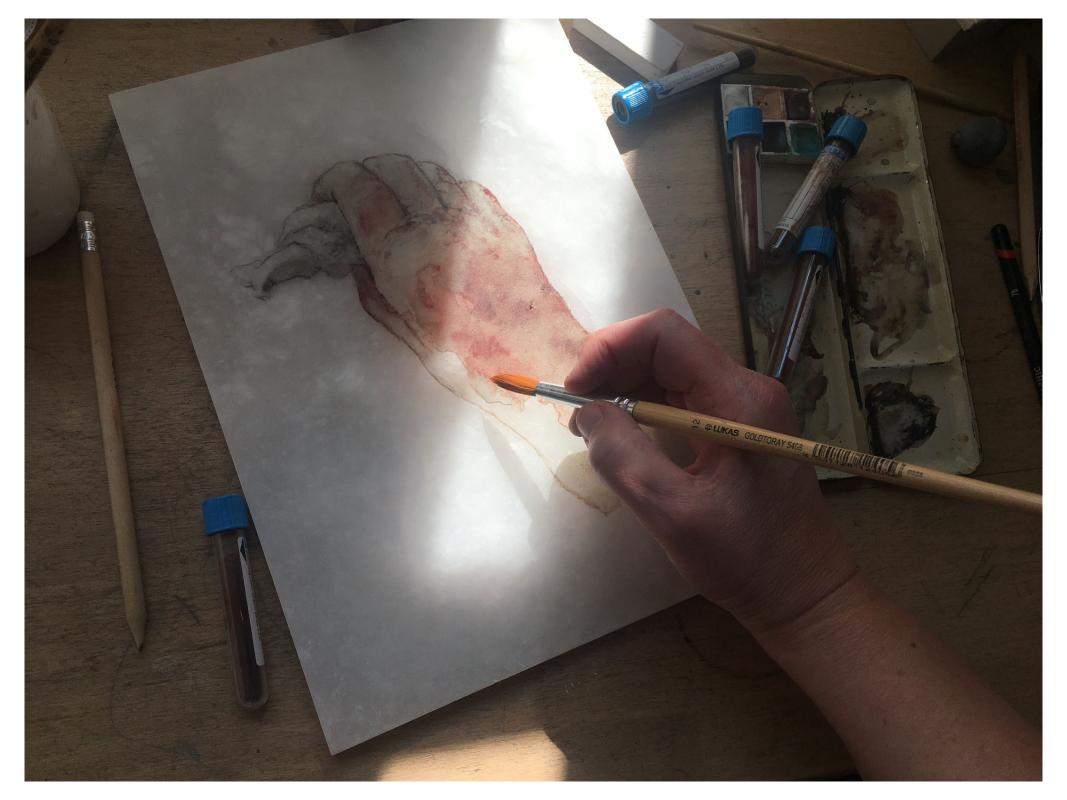

Moreover, since seasonal workers are not allowed, this vegetable is more expensive than ever.
